# **ORDO BAPTISMI PRO VNO PARVVLO** THE RITE OF CHRISTENING A CHILD

Reception of the Child

Baptism should be scheduled, whenever possible, for a Sunday, the day when the Church celebrates the Easter mystery, in the presence of, and with the active participation of, the faithful, or at least of relatives, friends, and neighbors.

It is for the father and the mother, in the presence of the godfather, to present their child to the Church for baptism.

As the faithful sing, if they like, some suitable psalm or hymn, the priest or deacon, having put on the alb or cassock and stole, or even a cope, in some festive color, goes along with the acolytes to the door of the church, or to that part of it where the parents and godparents are waiting with the child.

The celebrant greets all who are present, especially the parents and godparents, reminding all, in a few words, of the joy with which the parents received their child as a gift from God, the fountain of all life, who now deigns to lavish his own life upon it.

The celebrant first asks the parents:

Quod nomen infanti vestro imponere vultis (or imposuistis)?

What name do ye give (or have ye given) your child?

The parents: N.

The celebrant: Quid petitis ab Ecclesia Dei pro N.?

What do ye seek of the Church of God for N.?

The parents: Baptismum.

Baptism.

The celebrant can use other words in this dialogue, if he likes. The first answer can be given by another person, if such is the local custom. The celebrant then addresses the parents with these or similar words:

Baptismum pro infante vestro petentes, estisne conscii officii, quod suscipitis, illum in fide educandi, ut Dei mandata servans, Dominum et proximum suum diligat sicut Christus nos edocuit?

When ye ask that your child be baptized, are ye aware of the obligation, which ye have taken on, of bringing him up in the faith, so that keeping the commandments of God, he may love the Lord and his neighbor as Christ taught us?

The parents: Conscii sumus.

We realize it.

Turning to the godfather, the celebrant, with these or similar words, asks:

Estne paratus ad parentes huius infantis in suo munere adiuvandos?

Art thou prepared to help this child's parents to do their duty?

The Godfather: Paratus sum.

I am.

The celebrant then proceeds, saying:

N., magno gaudio communitas christiana te excipit. In cuius nomine ego signo te signo

crucis; et parentes tui (patrinusque vel et matrina) post me eodem signo Christi Salvatoris te signabunt.

N., the Christian community welcometh thee with great joy, and in its name I sign thee with the sign of the cross, and after me thy parents (or thy godfather or thy godmother) will sign thee with the same sign of Christ the Savior.

He makes the sign of the cross on the child's forehead, without saying anything. Then he invites the parents, and, if it seems appropriate, the godfather or godmother to do the same.

The celebrant invites the parents, the godfather, and others present to take part in the celebration of the word of God. If the circumstances permit, there should be a procession to the place where the readings are to take place, as the following, or similar verses, are chanted:

Nonne tu conversus vivificabis nos, et plebs tua laetabitur in te?
Ostende nobis, Domine, misericordiam tuam, et salutare tuum da nobis.
Audiam, quid loquatur Dominus Deus, quoniam loquetur pacem ad plebem suam et sanctos suos. (Ps. LXXXIV, 7-9b)

Wilt thou not turn again and quicken us: that thy people may rejoice in thee? Show us thy mercy, O Lord: and grant us thy salvation.

I will hearken what the Lord God will say: for he shall speak peace unto his people, and to his saints.

The Sacred Celebration of the Word of God The celebrant reads the following passage:

Et accedens Iesus locutus est eis dicens: "Data est mihi omnis potestas in caelo et in terra. Euntes ergo docete omnes gentes, baptizantes eos in nomine Patris et Filii et Spiritus Sancti, docentes eos servare omnia, quaecumque mandavi vobis. Et ecce, ego vobiscum sum omnibus diebus usque ad consummationem saeculi." (Matt. XXVIII, 18-20)

And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world."

After the reading, the celebrant should give a brief homily explaining the reading and leading those present to a deeper understanding of the mystery of baptism and to a more lively bearing of the responsibility it bestows, especially on the parents and godparents.

After the homily or the litany, or even during the litany, there should be a moment of silence during which, at the invitation of the celebrant, each one should pray in his own heart. If time allows, they may then sing an appropriate tune.

Quis similis tui in fortibus, Domine? Quis similis tui, magnificus in sanctitate, terribilis atque laudabilis, faciens mirabilia? (Exodus XV, 11)

Who is like unto thee, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like thee, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders?

Prayer of the Faithful

Celebrant: Fratres carissimi, pro hoc parvulo, qui gratiam Baptismi adepturus est, pro parentibus eius atque patrinis, pro omnibus baptizatis, Domini nostri Iesu Christi misericordiam invocemus.

Dearest brethren, let us implore the mercy of Our Lord Jesus Christ upon this child who is about to receive the grace of baptism, upon his parents and godparents, and upon all the baptized.

Lector: Ut, fulgente divino mysterio mortis et resurrectionis tuae, hunc parvulum per Baptismum regenerare et sanctae Ecclesiae aggregare digneris:

That, as the divine mystery of thy death and resurrection flasheth resplendently, thou mayest deign to regenerate this child through baptism and unite him to the Holy Church:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

Lector: Ut eum per Baptismum et Confirmationem fidelem discipulum et Evangelii tui testem efficere digneris:

That thou mayest deign to make him, through baptism and confirmation, thy faithful disciple and a witness to thy Gospel:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

Lector: Ut eum per sanctitatem vitae ad caelestis regni gaudia perducere digneris:

That thou mayest deign to lead him along,

through holiness of life, to the joys of the heavenly kingdom:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

Lector: Ut parentes et patrinos lucidum huic parvulo exemplar fidei constituere digneris:

That thou mayest deign to establish his parents and godparents as bright examples before him:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

Lector: Ut eius familiam semper in tua dilectione custodire digneris:

That thou mayest deign to maintain his family always in thy pleasure:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

Lector: Ut in nobis omnibus gratiam Baptismi renovare digneris:

That thou mayest deign to renew the grace of baptism in us all:

All: Te rogamus, audi nos.

Hear us, we beseech thee.

The celebrant then invites those present to call upon the saints:

Celebrant: Sancta Maria, Mater Dei, ora pro nobis.

Sancte Ioannes Baptista, ora pro nobis. Sancte Ioseph, ora pro nobis. Sancti Petre et Paule, orate pro nobis.

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us. St. John the Baptist, pray for us. St. Joseph, pray for us. Saints Peter and Paul, pray for us.

It is good to add here the names of other saints, especially of those who are the patrons of the child, the church, or the town. One then concludes:

Omnes Sancti et Sanctae Dei, orate pro nobis.

All ye saints of God, pray for us.

The Prayer of Exorcism and the Anointing before the Baptism

After the invocation of the saints is finished, the celebrant says:

Omnipotens, sempiterne Deus, qui Filium tuum in mundum misisti, ut Satanae, spiritus nequitiae, a nobis expelleret potestatem, et hominem, ereptum a tenebris, in admirabile lucis tuae regnum transferret, te supplices exoramus, ut hunc parvulum, ab originali labe solutum, tuae templum perficias maiestatis, et Spiritum Sanctum in eo habitare indulgeas. Per Christum Dominum nostrum.

Almighty, everlasting God, who didst send thy Son into the world to drive out from us the power of Satan, the spirit of wickedness, and to lead man, snatched from the darkness, into the wonderful kingdom of thy light, we humbly beseech thee to make this child, freed from original sin, the temple of thy majesty, and to suffer thy Holy Ghost to dwell in him. Through Christ our Lord.

All: Amen.

The celebrant continues:

Muniat te virtus Christi Salvatoris, in cuius signum te oleo linimus salutis, in eodem Christo Domino nostro, qui vivit et regnat in saecula saeculorum.

May the strength of Christ the savior fortify thee, in whose sign we anoint thee with the oil of salvation, in the same Christ our Lord, who liveth and reigneth for ever and ever.

All: Amen.

The celebrant anoints the child on the breast with the oil of the catechumens. All then proceed to the baptistery or, as the occasion may be, to the presbytery if the baptism is to be conferred there.

The Celebration of Baptism

When they arrive at the font, the celebrant briefly reminds those present of the wonderful plan of God, who willed to sanctify the soul and body of man through water. He may use the following or similar words:

Oremus, fratres dilectissimi, ut Dominus Deus omnipotens novam ex aqua et Spiritu Sancto vitam huic parvulo largiatur.

Let us pray, most beloved brethren, that the almighty Lord our God may lavish upon this child new life from water and the Holy Ghost.

Blessing and Invocation of God over the Water

Then, provided it is not Eastertide, the celebrant, turning to the font, offers the following blessing:

Deus, qui invisibili potentia per sacramentorum signa mirabilem operaris effectum, et creaturam aquae multis modis preparasti, ut Baptismi gratiam demonstraret; Deus, cuius Spiritus super aquas inter ipsa mundi primordia ferebatur, ut iam tunc virtutem sanctificandi aquarum natura conciperet; Deus, qui regenerationis speciem in ipsa diluvii effusione signasti, ut unius eiusdemque elementi mysterio et finis esset vitiis et origo virtutum; Deus, qui Abrahae filios per mare Rubrum sicco vestigio transire fecisti, ut plebs a Pharaonis servitute liberata, populum batizatorum praefiguraret;

Deus, cuius Filius, in aqua Iordanis a Ioanne baptizatus, Sancto Spiritu est inunctus, et, in cruce pendens, una cum sanguine aquam de latere suo produxit, ac, post resurrectionem suam, discipulis iussit, "Ite, docete omnes gentes, baptizantes eos in nomine Patris, et Filii, et Spiritus Sancti": Respice in faciem Ecclesiae tuae, eique dignare fontem Baptismatis aperire. Sumat haec aqua Unigeniti tui gratiam de Spiritu Sancto, ut homo, ad imaginem tuam conditus, sacramento Baptismatis a cunctis squaloribus vetustatis ablutus, in novam infantiam ex aqua et Spiritu Sancto resurgere mereatur.

O God, who by thy invisible might workest thy wonderful purpose through the signs of thy sacraments and hast in many ways prepared water, thy creation, to be a clear sign of the grace of baptism; O God, whose Spirit was borne above the waters amidst the very first beginnings of this world, so that even then the nature of water should take on the power to make holy; O God, who didst give an example of regeneration in the very torrent of the deluge, that by the inexplicable working of one and the same element there should result the end of evil and the source of moral perfection; O God, who didst provide a dry path through the Red Sea for the children of Abraham, so that that people, freed from slavery to Pharaoh, should prefigure the community of saints; O God, whose Son, baptized by John in the Jordan, was anointed by the Holy Ghost and, hanging on the cross, brought forth water from his side along with the blood, and, after his resurrection, commanded his disciples, "Go, teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost": look upon the face of thy Church, and vouchsafe to open unto her the spring of baptism. Let this water take the grace of thine Only-Begotten from the Holy Ghost, so that man, fashioned in thy likeness, may deserve to be born again from water and the Holy Ghost into a new childhood.

The celebrant touches the water with his right hand and continues:

Descendat, quaesumus, Domine, in hanc plenitudinem fontis per Filium tuum virtus Spiritus Sancti, ut omnes, cum Christo consepulti per Baptismum in mortem, ad vitam cum ipso resurgant. Per Christum Dominum nostrum.

May the power of thy Holy Ghost, through thy Son, come down, O Lord, into this font full of water, that all who through Baptism are buried together with Christ into death may rise up again with him. Through Christ our Lord.

#### All: Amen.

In Eastertide, if the baptismal water consecrated at the Easter Vigil is still available, the blessing and invocation of God over the water are made as follows, in order that at least some small measure of thanksgiving and petition may be included in the baptismal ceremony.

Celebrant: Benedictus Deus, Pater omnipotens, qui aquam ad purificandum et vivificandum creasti.

Blessed art thou, O God, Father almighty, who hast created water to purify and give life.

All: Benedictus Deus.

Blessed art thou, O God.

Celebrant: Benedictus Deus, Fili unigenite, Iesu Christe, qui de latere aquam cum sanguine profudisti, ut ex morte et resurrectione tua nasceretur Ecclesia.

Blessed art thou, O God, only-begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who didst bring forth water with blood from thy side, that out of thy death and resurrection the Church might be born.

All: Benedictus Deus.

Blessed art thou, O God.

Celebrant: Benedictus Deus, Spiritus Sancte, qui Christum ad aquas Iordanis baptizatum unxisti, ut omnes nos in te baptizaremur.

Blessed art thou, O God, Holy Ghost, who didst anoint the baptized Christ at the waters of the Jordan, that we might all be baptized in thee.

All: Benedictus Deus.

Blessed art thou, O God.

Celebrant: Huius aquae benedictae mysterio, ad spiritalem regenerationem introducere dignare famulos tuos (N. et N.) et famulas tuas (N. et N.), quos ad hoc lavacrum in fide Ecclesiae vocasti, ut habeant vitam aeternam. Per Christum Dominum nostrum.

By the mystery of this blessed water, mayest thou deign to bring thy servants (N. and N.) to a spiritual rebirth, them whom thou hast called to this bath in the faith of thy Church, that they might have life everlasting.

All: Amen.

Renunciation and Profession of Faith

The celebrant then warns the parents and godparents as follows:

Dilectissimi parentes et patrini: per sacramentum Baptismi parvulus a vobis oblatus novam a caritate Dei vitam accepturus est ex aqua et Spritu Sancto. Vos autem ita eum in fide educare studeatis, ut vita illa divina a peccati contagione praeservetur atque de die in diem in ipso possit augeri.

Si ergo, fide vestra ducti, parati estis ad hoc munus suscipiendum, Baptismi vestri memores, peccato abrenuntiate et in Christum Iesum profitemini fidem, quae est fides Ecclesiae, in qua parvuli baptizantur.

Dearest parents and godparents, through the sacrament of Baptism, the child whom ye have brought here is about to receive from the love of God new life of water and the Holy Ghost. See that ye take care so to nurse him in the faith that that divine life may be kept safe from the infection of sin and manage to increase in him from day to day.

If, therefore, inspired by your faith, ye are ready to undertake this obligation, mindful of your Baptism, renounce sin and profess your faith in Christ Jesus, which is the faith of the Church, in which children are baptized.

He then questions them:

Abrenuntiatis Satanae?

De ye renounce Satan?

Parents and godparents: Abrenuntio.

I do renounce him.

Celebrant: Et omnibus operibus eius?

And all his works?

Parents and godparents: Abrenuntio.

I do renounce them.

Celebrant: Et omnibus pompis eius?

And all his pomps?

Parents and godparents: Abrenuntio.

I do renounce them.

The celebrant then requires a triple profession of faith from both parents and god-parents, saying:

Creditis in Deum Patrem omnipotentem, creatorem caeli et terrae?

Do ye believe in God the Almighty Father, the creator of heaven and earth?

Parents and godparents: Credo.

I do believe in him.

Celebrant: Creditis in Iesum Christum, Filium eius unicum, Dominum nostrum, natum ex Maria Virgine, passum et sepultum, qui a mortuis resurrexit et sedet ad dexteram patris?

Do ye believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, born of the Virgin Mary, who died and was buried, and arose from the dead and sitteth at the right hand of the father?

Parents and godparents: Credo.

I do believe in him.

Celebrant: Creditis in Spiritum Sanctum, sanctam Ecclesiam catholicam, sanctorum communionem, remissionem peccatorum, carnis resurrectionem, et vitam aeternam?

Do ye believe in the Holy Ghost, the holy

catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and life everlasting?

Parents and godparents: Credo.

I do believe in them.

The Celebrant, together with all those present, gives his assent to this profession, saying:

Haec est fides nostra. Haec est fides Ecclesiae, quam profiteri gloriamur, in Christo Iesu Domino nostro.

This is our faith. This is the faith of the Church, which we glory to profess, in Christ Jesus our Lord.

All: Amen.

The Baptism

The celebrant invites the family to approach the font. He asks the parents and godparents, expressly naming the child:

Vultis igitur ut N. in fide Ecclesiae, quam vobiscum omnes modo professi sumus, Baptismum recipiat?

Are ye therefore willing that N. be baptized in the faith of the Church, which all of us have just professed with you?

Parents and godparents: Voluimus.

We are willing.

The celebrant immediately baptizes the child, saying:

N., Ego te baptizo in nomine Patris (he immerses the child or pours water on him for the first time), et Filii (he immerses the child or pours water on him for the second time), et Spritus Sancti (he immerses the child or pours water on him for the third time).

N., I baptize thee in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost.

After the child has been baptized, those in attendance make an appropriate brief acclamation.

Quis similis tui in fortibus, Domine? Quis similis tui, magnificus in sanctitate, terribilis atque laudabilis, faciens mirabilia? (Exodus XV, 11)

Who is like unto thee, O Lord, among the gods? Who is like thee, glorious in holiness, fearful in praises, doing wonders?

If the Baptism is by infusion, it is best for the mother or father to hold the child; however, where it seems best to keep to the prevailing custom to that effect, the godmother or godfather may hold him. If the baptism is by immersion, the same persons lift him out of the sacred font.

Additional Rites

Anointing after Baptism

The celebrant then says:

Deus omnipotens, Pater Domini nostri Jesu Christi, qui te a peccato liberavit et regeneravit ex aqua et Spiritu Sancto, ipse te linit chrismate salutis, ut, eius aggregatus populo, Christi sacerdotis, prophetae et regis membrum permaneas in vitam aeternam.

May Almighty God, the Father of Our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath freed thee from sin and regenerated thee from water and the Holy Ghost, anoint thee with the chrism of salvation, so that, joined to his people, thou mayest remain for ever a member of Christ the priest, prophet, and king.

All: Amen.

The celebrant, without saying anything, then anoints the child with the sacred chrism on the top of his head.

The Clothing with the White Garment

The celebrant says:

N., nova creatura factus es et Christum induisti. Vestis haec candida sit tibi signum dignitatis, quam, tuorum verbo et exemplo propinquorum adiutus, immaculatam perferas in vitam aeternam.

N., thou hast become a new creature and hast put on Christ. May this white garment be unto thee a sign of thy new station, and mayest thou, succored by the word and example of those about thee, wear it unblemished into life everlasting.

All: Amen.

The white garment is then put on the child; no other color is allowed, unless such is required by local custom. It is best that the relatives of the child provide the garment.

The Handing Over of the Lighted Candle

The celebrant then takes the Easter Candle and says:

Lumen Christi accipite.

Receive the light of Christ.

Someone (for example, the father or godfather) lights the candle of the child from the Easter Candle.

The celebrant then says:

Vobis, parentibus et patrino (vel patrinis), lumen hoc concreditur fovendum, ut parvulus iste, a Christo illuminatus, tamquam filius lucis indesinenter ambulet et, in fide perseverans, advenienti Domino occurrere valeat cum omnibus Sanctis in aula caelesti.

To you, the parents and godfather (or god-

parents), is this light entrusted to be nurtured, that this child, enlightened by Christ, may walk without interruption as a child of the light, and, persevering in the faith, may be able to meet the coming Lord with all the Saints in the heavenly court.

"Effetha"

The rite of the "Effetha" now takes place, if, indeed, the Conference of Bishops thinks it worth keeping. The celebrant touches the ears and the mouth of the child with his thumb, saving:

Dominus Iesus, qui surdos fecit audire et mutos loqui, det tibi ut mox possis auribus accipere verbum eius et profiteri fidem in laudem et gloriam Dei Patris.

May the Lord Jesus, who made the deaf hear and the dumb speak, grant thee that thou mayest soon receive his word with thine ears and profess the faith to the praise and glory of God the Father.

All: Amen.

The End of the Rite

After this, unless the baptism took place in the sanctuary itself, there should be a procession to the altar, during which the lighted candle of the baptized child is carried. Meanwhile, it is desirable that a baptismal tune be sung, for example:

Qui baptizati estis in Christo, Christum induistis, alleluia, alleluia.

Ye that have been baptized in Christ have put on Christ, alleluia, alleluia.

The Our Father

The celebrant, standing before the altar, addresses the parents, the godparents, and everyone else present with the following or like words:

Fratres dilectissimi: parvulus iste, qui, per Baptismum regeneratus, filius Dei nominatur et est, plenitudinem Spiritus Sancti per Confirmationem recipiet et, ad altare Domini accedens, particeps fiet mensae sacrificii eius ac Deum in medio Ecclesiae Patrem vocabit. Nunc nomine eius, in spiritu adoptionis filiorum, quem omnes accepimus, simul oremus uti Dominus nos docuit orare:

Dearest brethren, this child, who, regenerated through Baptism, is henceforth to be called a son of God, will receive the fulness of the Holy Ghost through Confirmation, and, going up unto the altar of the Lord, will become a partaker of his table of sacrifice, and in the midst of the Church will call God 'Father'. In his name now, and in that spirit of adopted children which we have all received, let us pray as the Lord taught us to pray:

And all say together with the celebrant:

Pater noster, qui es in caelis, sanctificetur nomen tuum; adveniat regnum tuum; fiat voluntas tua, sicut in caelo, et in terra. Panem nostrum cotidianum da nobis hodie; et dimitte nobis debita nostra, sicut et nos dimittimus debitoribus nostris; et ne nos inducas in temptationem; sed libera nos a malo.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

The Blessing and the Dismissal

The celebrant then blesses the mother (who holds her child in her arms), the father, and all present, saying:

Dominus Deus omnipotens, qui per Filium suum natum ex Maria Virgine christianas laetificat matres aeternae spe vitae, quae suis affulget infantibus, dignetur matrem huius benedicere infantis, ut, quae de sobole gratias nunc agit accepta, perpetuo cum ipsa in gratiarum maneat actione, in Christo Iesu Domino nostro.

May the Lord God Almighty, who, through his Son born of the Virgin Mary maketh glad Christian mothers with the hope of life everlasting, which shineth upon his children, deign to bless the mother of this child, so that she who now giveth thanks for the gift of this offspring may remain with it forever giving thanks, in Christ Jesus our Lord.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: Dominus Deus omnipotens, qui vitam terrenam largitur et caelestem, patrem huius infantis benedicat, ut, una cum coniuge sua, verbo et exemplo proli priorem se fidei testem exhibeat, in Christo Iesu Domino nostro.

May the Lord God Almighty, who bountifully giveth heavenly as well as earthly life, bless the father of this child, so that, together with his wife, he may, by word and example, be the first witness to the faith for his offspring.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: Dominus Deus omnipotens, qui nos ex aqua et Spiritu Sancto in vitam regneravit aeternam, hos fideles suos munificus benedicat, ut semper et ubique vivida sint membra populi sui, et pacem suam omnibus hic praesentibus largiatur, in Christo Iesu Domino nostro.

May the Lord God Almighty, who regenerated us from water and the Holy Ghost into life eternal, bountifully bless these his faithful, so that they may always and everywhere be lively members of his people, and may He munificently bestow his peace on all present

here, through Christ Jesus our Lord.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: Benedicat vos omnipotens Deus, Pater, et Filius, + et Spiritus Sanctus.

May God Almighty bless you, the Father, the Son, + and the Holy Ghost.

All: Amen.

Celebrant: Ite in pace.

Go in peace.

All: Deo gratias.

Thanks be to God.

After the blessing, everyone may sing a suitable tune that expresses the Easter joy and the giving of thanks, or they may sing the Magnificat of the Blessed Virgin Mary.

In those places where it is usual to present the baptized child at the altar of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the custom may be maintained.

Nos. 299-300 (June-July, 1991): The new Roman Martyrology for August is published. By the time you read this Newsletter, the process of "updating" the list of martyrs will have been completed. Among the names removed from the lists are Simeon of Luke II 25, the Good Thief, Lazarus, the Three Wise Men, the Centurion Cornelius, the soldier Longinus who put the spear into the side of Christ, etc. etc. According to 30 Days (No. 4, 1991, pages 76-77), Cardinal Stickler has complained of the removal of the biblical personalities. Indeed, if the saints must produce their birth certificates. then many heads will fall to the ax. What will happen when the Congregation sets itself loose on Adam and Eve, Noah, and Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob?

No. 301 (August, 1991): This issue contains the official Latin text of the "Swiss Canon" that has recently been the subject of controversy in the pages of 30 Days.

# From the Local Chapters

#### **CHICAGO**

Chapter Secretary Patrick Flaherty reports that our member John Loftus was married at a Latin Mass at St. John Cantius Church recently.

Also, our member Noel Ludwig celebrated the 25th anniversary of his marriage at another Latin Mass celebrated at St. John's on the feast of St. Luke. Flaherty has had the Latin Mass celebrated according to the Revised Missal for the students at the high school where he teaches. The Latin Mass has twice been celebrated at St. John's by Fr. Thomas J. Paprocki, Vice Chancellor of the Archdiocese and a former student of the Latinist Fr. Foster in Rome. Mozart's Vesperae Sollemnes de Confessore was sung at the conclusion of the Forty Hours Devotion in October, and on the second Sunday of November, Mozart's Sparrow Mass was performed. The second canon and Mozart's Mass in D (K. 194) were used at the Latin Midnight Mass on Christmas Eve, and three of the four Masses on Christmas Day were in Latin. On New Year's Eve, the Te Deum was chanted.

#### PITTSBURGH

Chapter Chairman Dr. Beierle headed a group that mailed out 1,000 picture postcards of St. Agnes Church, where the Latin Mass is celebrated every Sunday. On the back of the postcard, they wrote down the schedule of Latin services at the church. The Solemn High Latin Mass was sung at the church on Christmas Eve at midnight.

## From the Press

 The September 16, 1968 memorandum of the Jesuit Jedin on the condition of the Catholic Church in Germany appears in English translation for the first time in the November, 1991 number of *The Homiletic* and Pastoral Review. Jedin, the historian of the Council of Trent, has the following to say about the Latin Mass:

The Latin Mass, the bond of unity of the universal Church, should not be allowed to perish now that the world is becoming so much smaller. In every Church with several Sunday services, one Latin Mass should regularly remain. It will, as experience shows, be well attended.

About the International Federation *Una Voce*, he writes:

I do not believe that the founding and support of conservative, traditionalist groups and movements ("Una Voce", "Nunc et Semper" and the like) is the right way to prevent the schism or revolt threatening the Church.

The right way, he says, is for the bishops to do their job.

 In the November, 1991 issue of the Bulletin of the French Latin Liturgy Association, the President, Dr. Denis Crouan, makes some comments on the so-called Missals of St. Pius V and Pope Paul VI. Crouan writes that 1) Pius V never claimed to have made a Missal, 2) The Revised Latin Missal gives a better picture of what the Mass was like in the eighth and ninth centuries than does the old Missal, 3) No one should have to seek permission to celebrate the Latin Mass according to the revised rite, and 4) On account of their poor education, many priests (in America, most priests), including all young ones, are unable to celebrate Mass in Latin.

It is reported in the same number that the Latin High Mass is sung on the High Altar of the Val-de-Grace in Paris according to the new rite every Sunday at 11 AM. The LLA is congratulated for having received the Papal Blessing, and notice is given of a Gregorian Chant Weekend on Gregorian Mass IX at the Benedictine Monastery at Rosheim in Alsace to be directed by Dr. Crouan.

- 3. The ninth number (October, 1991) of the Newsletter of the Friends of the London Oratory reports that a munificent parishioner has endowed an annual Solemn Latin Requiem Mass to be sung with orchestra each October. This year, the music was Mozart's Requiem; the settings by Faure and Durufle will come next.
- 4. Professor Thomas Bird has sent us the November 20, 1991, issue of *The Catholic Sun*, newspaper of the Diocese of Syracuse, which contains a front-page illustrated article on the Latin Mass celebrated according to the 1962 Roman Missal at four locations in the diocese. One of the celebrants, Fr. Mikalajunas, was ordained after the Council and had to learn from scratch. There are still two centers of the Society of St. Pius X in the diocese; the Bishop has issued a decree that they are "not in communion with the Roman Catholic Church".
- 5. In the July-August, 1991 French edition of 30 Days, Silvio Cardinal Oddi reports that the late Franjo Cardinal Seper, the Croatian Head of the Holy Office during the latter part of the reign of Pope Paul, once told him, "As for that Canon (the Second Eucharistic Prayer), I will never adopt it myself." The English 30 Days has resumed publication; it is now challenged by Fr. Fessio's new magazine, The Catholic World Report, whose first issue, dated November, 1991, was a great disappointment. Ten of the 72 pages are given over to a reprint of some passages from an Ignatius Press book by Cardinal de Lubac, as if the editors could not come up with enough new material to complete the issue. The maps are crudely drawn; there are no boundaries between Belgium and Holland, or between Germany and Denmark. Germany is incorrectly listed as a "Protestant" country rather than a "Catholic and Protestant" country. Yugoslavia has been dissolved into its constituent parts, but Montenegro is nowhere to be seen;

- the cartographers have given it to Serbia. There is a twelve page report on the abortion controversy in Wichita, and the five-page "People in the News" section is inevitably boring, since it gives a few inadequate sentences each to a large number of stories. There is, though, an interview with Cardinal Ratzinger, in which he says, "I think that Lefebvre's schism plays a relatively small role in today's society."30 Days, however, is back in its old form, for there are several pages devoted to secret societies and Masons, and the English translation of most articles is in quality far below mediocrity; indeed, the Chairman finds some pieces unintelligible.
- 6. The November, 1991 issue of *The Diocese of Orange Bulletin* has a long, illustrated, and sympathetic article by Matt Cunningham on the Latin Masses celebrated in the diocese. The correspondent, who was born the year before Vatican II concluded, appears to have relied on "traditionalist" sources in composing his article.
- 7. The Texas Catholic Herald of November 22, 1991, publishes the regulations set by Bishop Fiorenza of Houston governing the celebration of the Latin Mass (1962 Missal) at Annunciation Church in that city. He orders that the Mass be stopped if fewer than 100 people attend on each of three consecutive Sundays. As a result, the Latinists at the Church have become census takers, and each week the attendance figures are published in the Sunday bulletin so that all may be warned if the number of souls should fall dangerously low. The bishop makes himself ridiculous by saying that people under 30 should stay away. No other sacraments are to be dispensed according to the former ceremonies.
- 8. An article "New Vita for an Old Lingua" by Kenneth Woodward appeared in the Veterans' Day edition of Newsweek. The article mentions the publication of the new Italian-Latin dictionary of modern words. (See page 7, item #19, of the December, 1991 issue of the LLA Newsletter.) It also discusses the decline of Latin at the Holy See. Fr. Reginald Foster, called the "dean of Vatican Latinists", is quoted as saying, "I don't know who's reading these things," as he waves at shelves of bound Latin translations of official Church documents, which were most likely originally written in Italian or Polish. Foster, the article says, teaches Latin after hours to anyone who wants to learn; it is said that he is sometimes found in a blue jumpsuit holding classes in pizzerias. "Latin is a culture - character - and it's broader than the Church," he says. Some of his best students are American Jews from New York. "You don't have to be Catholic to love Latin," he says.
- 9. Our Columbus, Ohio member Paul Berry

has sent the Chairman the December 9, 1991 issue of the Weekly English Edition of L'Osservatore Romano, where there is an account of the debate at the recent Roman Synod on Europe. Bishop Gyorgy Jakubinyi, the Hungarian Titular Bishop of Aquae Regiae in partibus infidelium, Auxiliary Bishop of Alba Julia, Romania, said, in his speech of November 29:

We have also heard talk of linguistic imperialism. The larger countries want to impose their language and their own culture and world-view on others. Latin would be a good solution, but nowadays it is not used as before. So we need an artificial international language that does not have a country behind it. A practical solution would be Esperanto. In the Church we should always assure the use of the mother tongue so as to discourage assimilation in the guise of the liturgy.

On the subject of Esperanto, LLA members are referred to what Cardinal Bacci had to say in his *Memoirs*, the English translation of which appeared in this Newsletter some time ago, and which is still available from the Chairman in booklet form for \$6.

10. On November 9, 1991 the newspaper Staten Island Advance published the results of a telephone poll conducted by our New York Chapter Chairman, Attorney William J. Leininger, on the attitudes of the area's Catholics towards the Latin Mass in the 1962 Missal. The survey was "conducted with sophisticated computer equipment which calls people, asks them the questions, and records their responses electronically". The results thusfar are:

38% I would attend occasionally.

21% I would never attend.

21% I would attend every Sunday.

20% I would attend frequently

11. Fr. Joseph E. Scardella, director of the Office of Worship for the Diocese of Syracuse, is the author of the editorial "Union and diversity" in the December 12-18, 1991 issue of The Catholic Sun, newspaper of the Diocese. The priest was evidently dismayed by the article of November 20 (see item #4 above), with its many positive reactions to the Latin Mass, and writes to blame all the trouble on "the lack of liturgical catechisis" (i.e., the stupidity of the people). He gives a bird's eye history of the liturgy, which is not without many errors. (He says, for example, that the last ecumenical council before Vatican II was the one at Trent.) In his history of the orientation of the altar. celebrant and priest, he does not mention the east. The Director is keen on the liturgical reforms, and he quotes at great length from

- the Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, but one paragraph he omits is 36 §1, that the use of Latin is to be preserved. The Syracusan Latinists will regret having come under the baleful gaze of this priest.
- 12. "How and How Not to Say Mass" is the subject of a sensible piece by the English Jesuit Deryck Hanshell in the Fall, 1991 number of Sacred Music. This article, like all things written by its author, is most instructive; it is a sort of little Ritus Servandus (6 large pages). It warns celebrants against various unseemly and popular gestures and practices that are now common and which are not becoming to the celebration of sacred rites. The author draws heavily on the rubrics of the former Roman Missal, which have never been superseded in common sense. In the same issue, there is the essay "Inaugurating a New Basilica" by our member Attorney Duane L.C.M. Galles, who makes suggestions about the ceremonies and choir dress that would be appropriate when a church is raised to the rank of basilica.

# **Newsworthy Items**

- The St. Gregory's Society of New Haven, Connecticut performed a concert of Sacred Music at Yale University on December 6, 1991, in order to raise money for the Latin Masses it promotes at Sacred Heart Church in the city. The program included Missa Ave Maris Stella by Victoria, motets by Palestrina and Byrd, and Gregorian Chants.
- Dr. Beierle reports that 125 people attended the Latin Mass on All Souls Day at St. Agnes Church in Pittsburgh; on the Feast of Christ the King, there was a procession followed by benediction after the Latin Mass, with two priests and five acolytes, candles, and continuous incensing of the monstrance around the inside of the church.
- 3. In his 41st Letter to Friends and Benefactors, the Superior General of the Society of St. Pius X quotes with approbation the following letter sent by a 17-year-old Ukrainian to the late Archbishop Lefebvre shortly before that prelate's death. The Superior General, Fr. Franz Schmidberger, says that the mission of his Society can hardly be better described than it is in this letter:

I am writing to you, your Excellency, to express to you my passionate admiration for your heroic struggle, laden with self-denial, against the abominable heresy already penetrating into the very highest layers of the Church's hierarchy. Safeguarding the purity and holiness of the Church of St. Peter is the highest duty of Christians who call themselves truly Catholic. . . .

Since I belong to the Roman Catholic Church, her present and future very much concern me. I am always extremely anxious when I see Our Holy Church

losing her exclusivity. She is perishing. Your Excellency; in the name of heaven, I beg of you, save her! What a heresy, this friendly dialoguing with other religions! What a foul sin! My God! Saint Louis of France, Saint Dominic, Saint Ignatius of Loyola, they organized crusades, they glorified our Church by their fearless undertakings, they mercilessly extirpated heretics for love of their neighbor! What grand models for us to follow - the great opponents of the Reformation, Charles Borromeo, Pius V of glorius memory. I believe they are weeping from Paradise above where God has placed them when they see our present Pope going in for such abominations. What a disgrace! Your Excellency, you are absolutely right, the Catholic Church's future is in her past . . .

We must restore our Church's past splendor, she must change her attitude towards heretical religions, she must renounce all co-operation with them, she must do away with the deplorable and deadly resolutions of the Second Vatican Council, she must fight communism and atheism . . .

Allow me to assure you, Most Reverend Father, that you have many supporters in Russia praying for you in secret. I am one of the them . . .

I am body and soul devoted to you for

It is quite shocking that in 1991 a young fellow can write to a Catholic priest in praise of the merciless extirpation of human beings and receive no reprimand, nay, even have his letter be held up as worthy of commendation. The youngster even goes so far as to say that the killers killed for "love of their neighbor". Rubbish! They killed because they were crazy; let us call a spade a spade. It is no part of the religion of the dulcis virgo Maria to slaughter non-Catholics. Priests and organizations that promote this sort of thinking or remain silent when confronted with it are guilty of the inevitable crimes that will one day follow upon it. - 6. Mr. Albert D. Huntz, President of *Una Voce* Buffalo, writes that the Mozart *Requiem* was performed at a Solemn High Latin Requiem Mass at St. Joseph's Church in Buffalo on December 5, 1991. The Orchestra and Chorus of the State University of New York at Buffalo provided the music. The expenses were in part defrayed by the New York State Council on the Arts, the Music Performance Trust Fund, and the Student Association of SUNY Buffalo. Sixteen days earlier, the Bishop of Buffalo had allowed a *Requiem* High Mass in Latin for the funeral of one of Mr. Huntz's members.
- 7. Our member Col. William S. O'Connor has sent the Chairman the Newsletter *Dominus Vobiscum* published by the people who attend the Latin Mass at St. Agatha's Church in St. Louis, Missouri. Hundreds attend, and during the past year there were visiting choirs from St. Peter's Church in Jefferson City and The Southern Illinois University of Edwardsville.
- 8. Our member Peter F. Meggison writes:

A 60-minute cassette of traditional Catholic hymns composed by Sister Mary Alexis Donnelly, R.S.M. (1857-1936), has been produced by LLA member Peter Meggison. The hymns are sung by the renowned Dorian Concert Choir of Providence, R.I. The 18 selections include two Latin selections -Ave Verum and Ecce Sacerdos Magnus as well as 16 selections commonly heard at Low Masses, Benediction, Marian devotions, and other liturgical services prior to Vatican II. - 11. Fr. Paprocki, Vice Chancellor of the Archdiocese of Chicago, was a student of the Latinist Fr. Reginald Foster at the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome, where he was studying for his doctorate in canon law. At the invitation of our member Patrick D. Flaherty, Chicago LLA secretary, Fr. Paprocki wrote the following account of Foster's method.

Thank you for your letter inquiring about my Latin studies in Rome. It is a pleasure for me to tell you more about my Latin "experiences" with Fr. Reginald Foster, as he calls them. He prefers to call his gatherings with students "experiences" rather than "classes", since the latter term connotes a dry academic exercise, rather than the enchanting exposure to a very beloved language that all true Latinists know them to be! Each year's gatherings are considered one full Experience. Reggie, as we called him, allowed me to skip his First Experience, because I had four years of high school Latin at Quigley Preparatory Seminary South. I was fortunate to study with him for three and a half years, completing his Fifth Experience, which is the highest level he offers.

Fr. Foster's approach is to read from a wide variety of works, including classical and ecclesiastical authors. Rather than work our way through lengthy works, Fr. Foster usually preferred to have us translate letters and other shorter pieces. This enabled us to look at a variety of works over a wide span of centuries, thus getting a feel for the Latin usage of a particular era. In fact, Fr. Foster essentially contends that one can learn the Latin language quite well simply by reading the letters of Cicero.

His teaching method involves doing a homework sheet to prepare for each class. Each sheet required the translation of several brief passages from Latin to

English as well as from English to Latin. This would be followed by a series of questions and exercises, such as identifying why the subjunctive mood was used in a particular phrase or sentence, or changing verbs from the active to the passive voice, or vice versa. We also read and translated passages in class. Fr. Foster's "Second Experience" is an exercise in Latin conversation, which I found quite helpful, since I was required to make a half-hour oral presentation in Latin at my doctoral defense in canon law, followed by another hour of questions and answers with the professors!
