News from the Association of Latin Liturgy (UK)

The next ALL General Membership Meeting will take place on Saturday October 28, 2017, in Cardiff at the University Chaplaincy. The day will include a Latin Mass (Ordinary Form) in the morning, and conclude with an Extraordinary Form Latin Mass, with chanting some of the Liturgy of the Hours, as well as speakers and fellowship.

The most recent copy of the ALL Newsletter reported that the ALL is in the process of developing diocesan representatives who can report to the association the use of Latin within Masses in their respective dioceses.

ALL Chairman, Christopher Francis, reminded members that "We are who we are because of what and whom we remember." For example, knowing the "Hail Mary" by heart identifies us as Catholics. Those of us who have memorized Latin chants, hymns, and prayers know how integral those memories are to who we are.

News from the Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter (FSSP)

Effective August 1, 2017, St. Alphonsus Church (National Shrine of St. Alphonsus Ligouri), Archdiocese of Baltimore, was transferred to the care of the Priestly Fraternity of St. Peter. This is the first apostolate for the Fraternity in the Baltimore-Washington metropolitan area. Father Joel Kiefer, formerly of Seattle, will be the new pastor. St. Alphonsus has been a site for the Traditional Latin Mass for over twenty years.

October 18, 2017 will mark the beginning of the 30th year of the founding of the Fraternity, and its 25th year of operation in North America. The North American district serves in 44 dioceses across the US and Canada, at 47 different locations, with 104 priests.

Father Fryar just notified us that he has a new website. It still has the same name—but is now hosted on Amazon, rather than in Florida. It is anticipated that this will enable fewer interruptions to service, when there is inclement weather in Florida. The Traditional Roman Hymnal, Second Edition

Angelus Press has announced the release of the second edition of *The Traditional Roman Hymnal*. The new edition has a maroon color, to distinguish it from the first edition, which has blue cover. The new edition has 456 pages, and includes 360 traditional chants and hymns. There are also multiple indices: title, author, translator, and composer. The retail price is \$34.95, but bulk pricing is available.

Collects of the Roman Missals of 1962 and 2002, (Kindle)

In 2013, Lauren Pristas, Professor of Theology at Caldwell College in New Jersey, first released her comparative study of the Sunday Latin Collects before and after the Second Vatican Council. The e-book version is now available on Amazon at less than half the price of the original paperback print version. (Editor’s Note: A very commendable work. Factual, not polemic. Dr. Pristas does not have much to say by way of opinion. She lets the facts speak volumes. The collects of the Mass of Paul VI present us with a new theology of Catholicism Lite, and trash tradition by shuffling the collects as though they were a deck of cards, many of which end up on the floor – i.e. sadly lost.)

Latin Hymns of the Roman Breviary

Former Latin scholar, Father Martin D. O’Keefe, SJ (RIP) left us all a great treasure in his 2002 volume, Exultemus: Rejoicing with God in the Hymns of the Roman Breviary, published by the Institute of Jesuit Sources at <http://jesuitsources.bc.edu/exultemus-rejoicing-with-god-in-the-hymns-of-the-roman-breviary/> . The book of 397 pages provides a dignified and reverent translation of the nearly 300 Latin hymns that were dropped in favor of “extant English poetry”, when the Breviary was translated into English. It is still available, according to the Jesuit Sources website.

Catholic Bibliographic Index available

Preserving Christian Publications, Inc. has released an on-line *Catholic Bibliographic Index*. The index includes 25,409 titles, many that are out-of-print. Some are available in libraries and other locations. There are 1,425 titles in Latin. The index can be browsed by category or topic. PCP also has their current catalog of both in-print and out-of-print books available as either a print copy, or downloadable electronic copy. See: www.pcpbooks.net for more information.

St. Augustine Academy Press

This family apostolate in Homer Glen, IL is best known for their beautiful publication, *Treasure and Tradition, The Ultimate Guide to the Latin Mass*. They have recently announced the completion of two graded Religion series—one from the 1930's, and one from the late 1950's. *Highway to Heaven* is the catechism series from the 1930's and covers grades 1-8. *Our Holy Faith* is the Religion series from the late 1950's and covers grades 4-8 (including Teacher Manuals). Grades 1-3 are still available from Tan Books.

Noble Beauty, Transcendent Holiness--Why the Modern Age Needs the Mass of Ages

This new book, released June 7, 2017, by Peter Kwasniewski. It is available at Amazon.com for less than \$20.00. Dr. Kwasniewski teaches at Wyoming Catholic College, and leads the schola there. If you need fresh insights to help explain the relevance of the Traditional Latin Mass to some of your contemporaries, this may be the book for you! (Editor's Note: If you are a subscriber to *The Latin Mass Magazine*, be advised that this "new book" is chiefly a compilation of articles Professor Kwasniewski has written over the period from 2006 through 2012 for that worthy publication. Individual chapters are quite good, their integration less than seamless.)

Father Leopold Celebrates Mass Lego ® Kit

Several Catholic sites (Leaflet Missal Co., St. Patrick's Guild, and Holy Heroes) are currently offering the Father Leopold Celebrates Mass Lego ® Kit. This is a 174 piece genuine Lego ® Kit. The kit includes altar, ambo, credence table, tabernacle, lectionary, paten, cruets, hosts, chalice, vestments (green, red, white and violet) and a 28 page instruction booklet. If you want to "see before you buy", Holy Heroes includes a 2-minute video of a boy who shows the major pieces, as he has set them up. The kit sells for between \$50-60, depending on which site you use. Due to the small pieces, this kit is recommended for ages 6 years and up.

“On Hearing Confessions During Sunday Mass” (Reprinted from *Memento*, July 2017)

Observant visitors attending a Sunday Mass at an FSSP apostolate may be surprised to discover a confession line: while one priest is celebrating Mass, another is shriving sins. Since this normally does not happen in a typical parish setting, one might wonder why it occurs at all. Besides, should not all the faithful be fulfilling their Sunday obligation by actually participating in the Mass? And even if going to confession prepares the sinner to receive Holy Communion worthily, shouldn't a person avail himself of this channel of divine mercy outside the celebration of Mass, so that he can enter into the sacred mysteries with undivided attention?

Simply speaking, we would answer these questions in the affirmative. Ideally, everyone should assist at Mass from beginning to end without interruption. Practical considerations, however, require a pastoral approach somewhat divergent from the ideal so as to accommodate the legitimate needs of the faithful.

Because the celebration of the *usus antiquior* is relatively rare, many of the faithful seeking to worship according to this form of the Roman rite must travel far greater distances than the parishioner who attends his local parish. That is why most parishes of the FSSP are not defined by geographical area. Since the members of such parishes usually wish to avail themselves of the Sacrament of Penance, it would be onerous to demand that they never do so during Sunday Mass when other days and times are impracticable. Thus, when the number of such parishioners is fairly high, one can expect confessions to be heard not only on Sundays outside of Mass, but also during Sunday Mass itself.

Though this pastoral approach to a practical problem falls short of the ideal, it nevertheless has received papal approval: “It is particularly recommended that in places of worship, confessors be visibly present ... and that confessions be especially available even during Mass, in order to meet the needs of the faithful” (John Paul II, Apostolic Letter: *Misericordia Dei*, 7 April, 2002, 1b-2: 1, c. 455).

The Catechism of the Catholic Church observes that the sacrament of Penance is called “confession” not only because “the disclosure of sins to a priest is an essential element of this sacrament,” but also because it is an “acknowledgement and praise...of the holiness of God and of His mercy toward sinful man.” (CCC 1424)

Thus, whether they be devoutly assisting at Mass from their pews or confessing their sins that they might receive Holy Communion worthily or with greater devotion, the faithful render praise and gratitude to God for His enduring mercy and goodness toward men through Christ.
